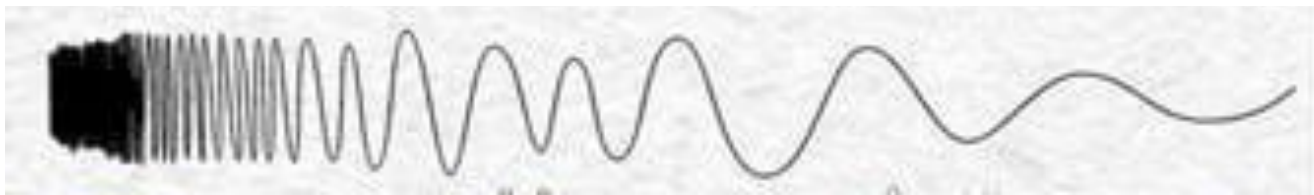
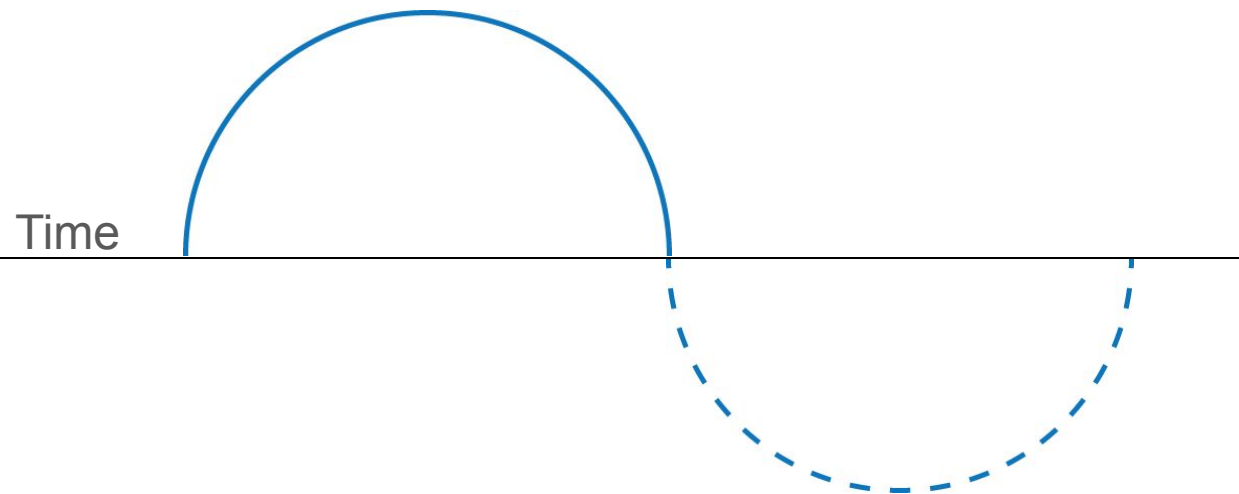
The Electromagnetic Spectrum



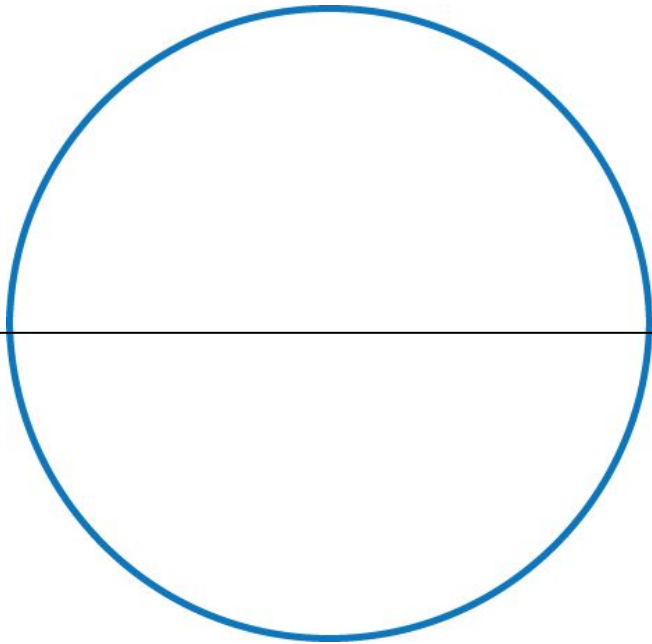
Circle Is a cycle projected in Space



Cycle Is a Circle projected over Time



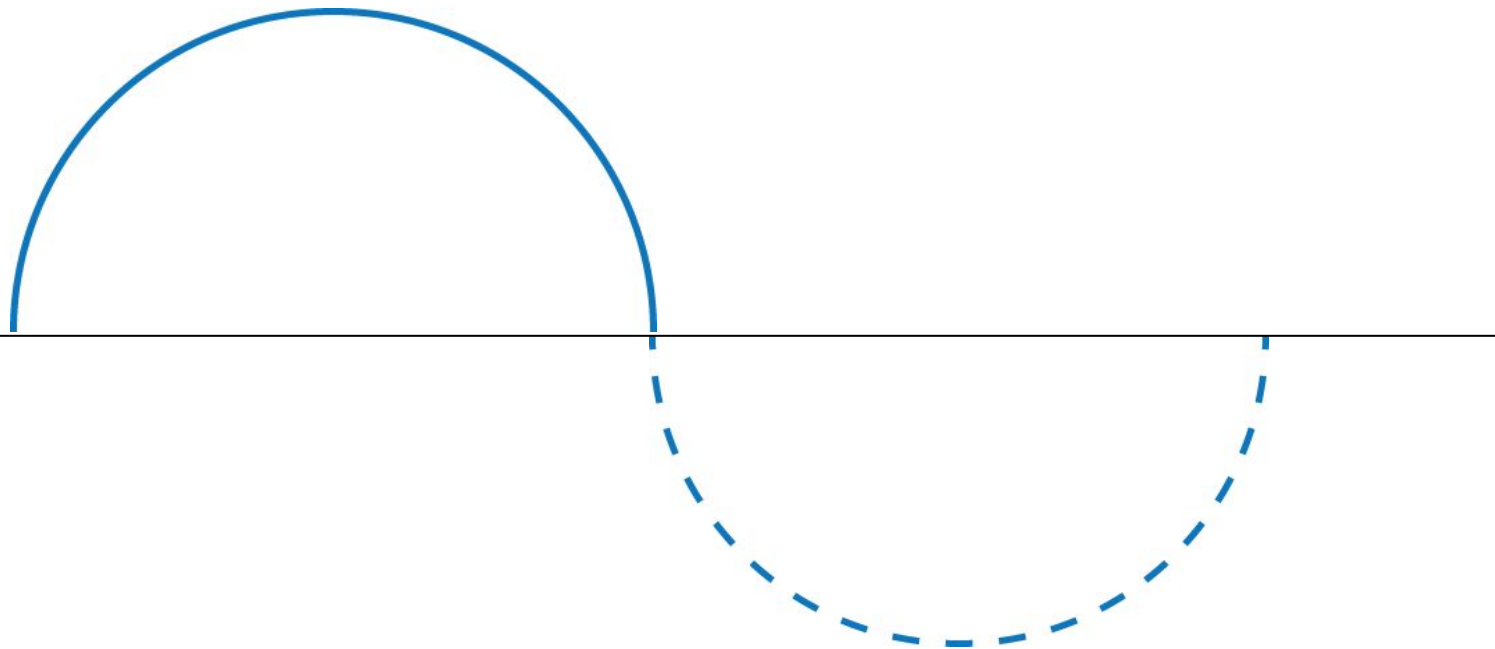

rainbow, water, snakes, and fertility, often depicted as a serpent and considered the wife of Damballah Wedo. depicted as a serpent also

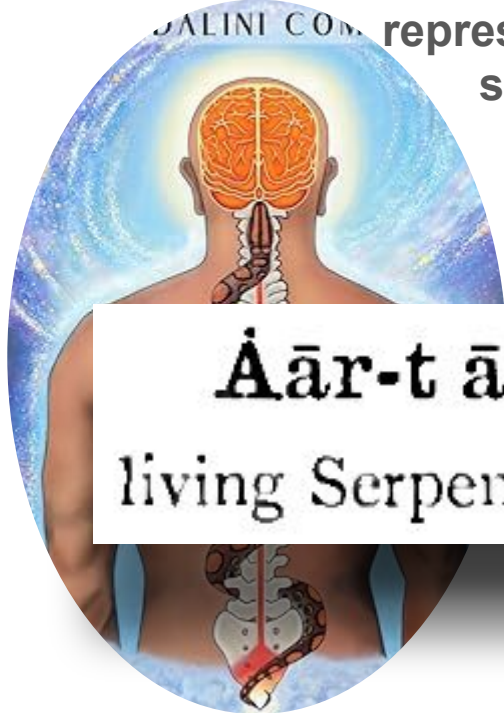

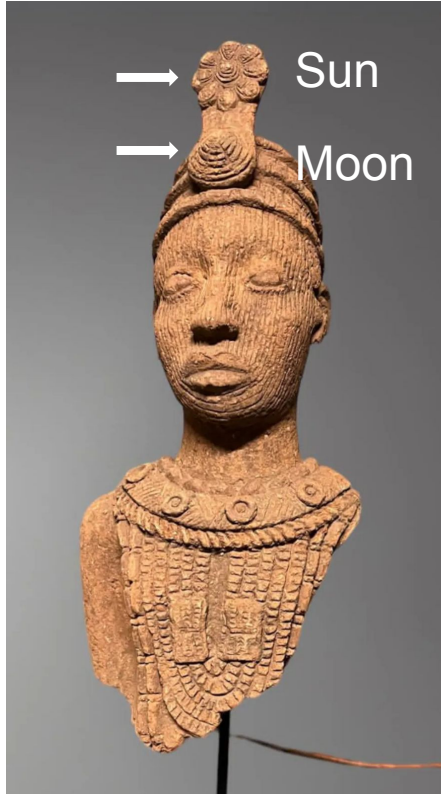

Etymology of The word “Spirit”

Etymology. The word spirit came into Middle English via Old French esperit. Its source is Latin spīritus, whose original meaning was "breath, breathing" and hence "**spirit**, **soul**, courage, vigor"; its ultimate origin is a Proto-Indo-European root *(s)peis.

In a spiritual context, the "soul" often refers to the essence of a person's being, encompassing their mind, will, and emotions, while the "spirit" is seen as the connection to a higher power or God, representing a deeper, more spiritual aspect of a person



The English word "**soul**" originates from Old English "sāwol," meaning "soul, life, **spirit**, being," ultimately stemming from Proto-Germanic "*saiwalō" of uncertain origin, with cognates in other Germanic languages like German "Seele" and Dutch "ziel"

Etymology of The word “Spirit”

To understand the nuances of "soul" and "spirit," it's helpful to delve into their etymological roots. Here's a breakdown:

Soul:

- The English word "soul" comes from the Old English "sawol," which itself derives from the Proto-Germanic **saiwalō*.
- There are some interesting theories regarding the older origins of the word. Some researches have suggested that it might have been connected to words relating to "sea" or "lake". This could be due to ancient beliefs regarding the dwelling place of souls.
- In essence, "soul" has historically been associated with the vital principle of a living being, **the animating force within.**

Spirit:

- "Spirit" originates from the Latin "spiritus," which means "breath."
- This Latin word is connected to the verb "spirare," meaning "to breathe."
- Therefore, "spirit" fundamentally relates to the concept of breath, and by extension, to **the animating force of life.**
- This connection to "breath" is significant, as breath was often seen as the physical manifestation of life itself.

Etymology of The word “Spirit”

Key Observations:

- Both "soul" and "spirit" have historical connections to the concept of "breath." This highlights the ancient understanding of life as being intrinsically linked to the act of breathing.
- However, over time, distinctions arose. "Soul" came to be associated more with the individual's essence, personality, and consciousness, while "spirit" took on a more transcendent meaning, relating to a vital force or connection to the divine.
- It is also very important to note that the greek words "psykhē" and "pneuma" also have a very strong connection to the words "soul" and "spirit" respectively. And those greek words also have very strong ties to the idea of breath.
